#### Restaurant & Take-Out Appetizing Counter

Russ & Daughters at the Jewish Museum serves classic appetizing foods in both a kosher sit-down restaurant and take-out appetizing counter. Purveyors of the highest quality smoked fish, herring, bagels, and traditional baked goods, this landmark New York City institution is owned and operated by the fourth generation of the Russ family, just as it has been since 1914.

The restaurant offers a selection of classic appetizing foods drawn from the original Russ & Daughters shop as well as the Russ & Daughters Cafe, including: smoked fish platters, bagels and bialys, knishes, herring, salads, soups, egg creams, and desserts such as babka and black and white cookies. The take-out appetizing counter offers traditional smoked fish and spreads by the pound, as well as bagel sandwiches, herring, baked goods, and sweets.

**Scenes from the Collection**

This presentation of selections from the Jewish Museum's collection features a range of painting, sculpture, photography, decorative arts, ceremonial objects, antiquities, works on paper, and media. Divided into several *Scenes*, this dynamic installation explores ways in which art and objects are shaped by context and perspective, with each item touching upon a facet of the broader Jewish experience. Several *Scenes* will rotate throughout the year, drawing from the Museum's collection of nearly 30,000 objects.

**Modigliani Unmasked**

**Closing February 4, 2018**

An exhibition of approximately 150 works—including a large selection of Amedeo Modigliani's early drawings, as well as paintings and sculptures—illuminate how the artist's heritage as an Italian Sephardic Jew is essential to understanding his artistic output.

**Marc Camille Chaimowicz: Your Place or Mine...**

**March 16, 2018 – August 5, 2018**

Chaimowicz established himself in the 1970s London art scene as an artist who merged performance and installation art in a manner as playful as it was critical and sensual. The artist's first solo museum exhibition in the United States presents his cross-disciplinary work in sculpture, painting, video, collage, installation, and design made over his nearly 50-year career.

**Math Bass: Crowd Rehearsal**

Los Angeles-based artist Math Bass (b. 1981) works across video and performance as well as painting and sculpture, which she executes in a distinctly graphic style. In her lobby installation the title and forms suggest, but do not show, human bodies and actions.

**Veiled Meanings: Fashioning Jewish Dress, from the Collection of The Israel Museum, Jerusalem**

**Closing March 18, 2018**

The first comprehensive U.S. exhibition drawn from The Israel Museum's world-renowned collection of Jewish costumes showcases over 100 articles spanning the eighteenth through twentieth centuries. Demonstrating how garments conceal as much as they reveal, the extraordinary range of textile design illuminates the story of how diverse global cultures thrived, interacted, and inspired each other.
